## What are the capacity, capability, and competency?

**Capacity:** the **potential** or power to accomplish tasks or achieve goals → frequently referring resources, time, energy, or facility

**Capability:** the ability to perform specific tasks or functions and achieve specific outcomes → **skill sets, ability, and system**

**Competency:** a specific set of skills, behaviors, and knowledge that an individual needs to perform a particular role or task **effectively**

**Competency is the proven ability**

**Capability is demonstrated through competency**

**Capacity enables capability**

## Capacity Building in UN SDG context: Goal 17

“Capacity building activities are also aimed at **strengthening and maintaining the capabilities of states and societies** to design and implement strategies that minimize the negative impacts of current social, economic and environmental crises and emerging challenges. “

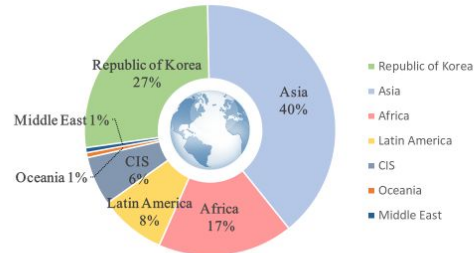

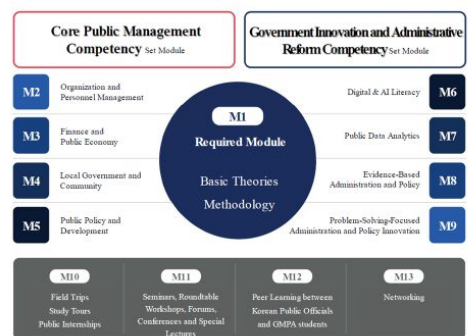
### 3. Overview of GMPA — Diversity of the GMPA —

The Bank's instrument for providing capacity development at scale through the enhanced Virtual Capacity Development Academy (VCDA), designed to provide just-in-time capacity development for Regional Member Countries (RMCs) are discussed. 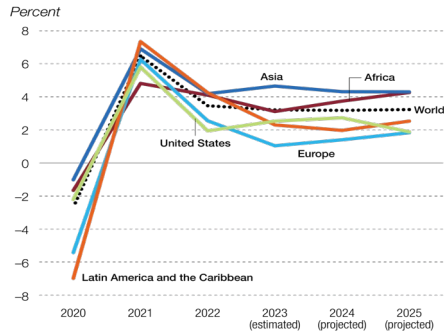

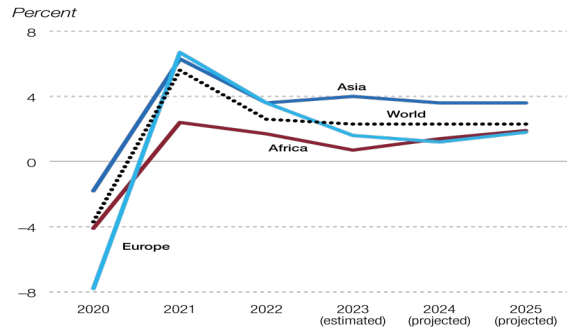
## Africa's Growth Performance and Outlook

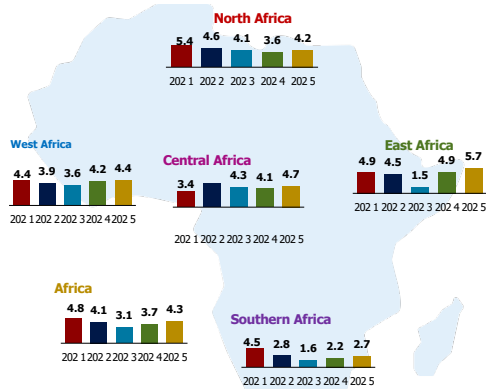
Real GDP per capita growth, 2020-2025

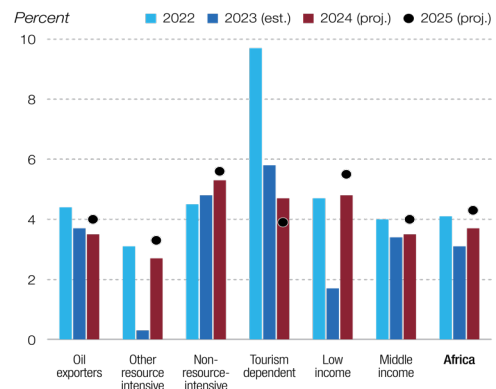
## Growth Performance and Outlook Across Africa's Regions and Economic Groupings

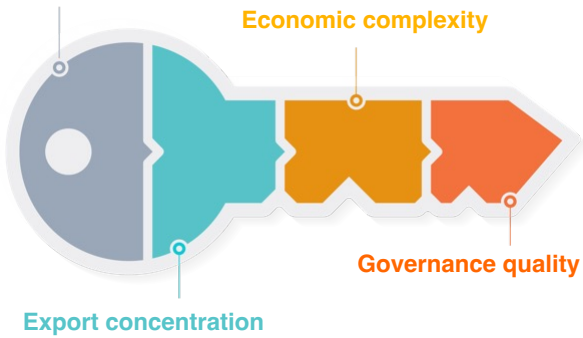

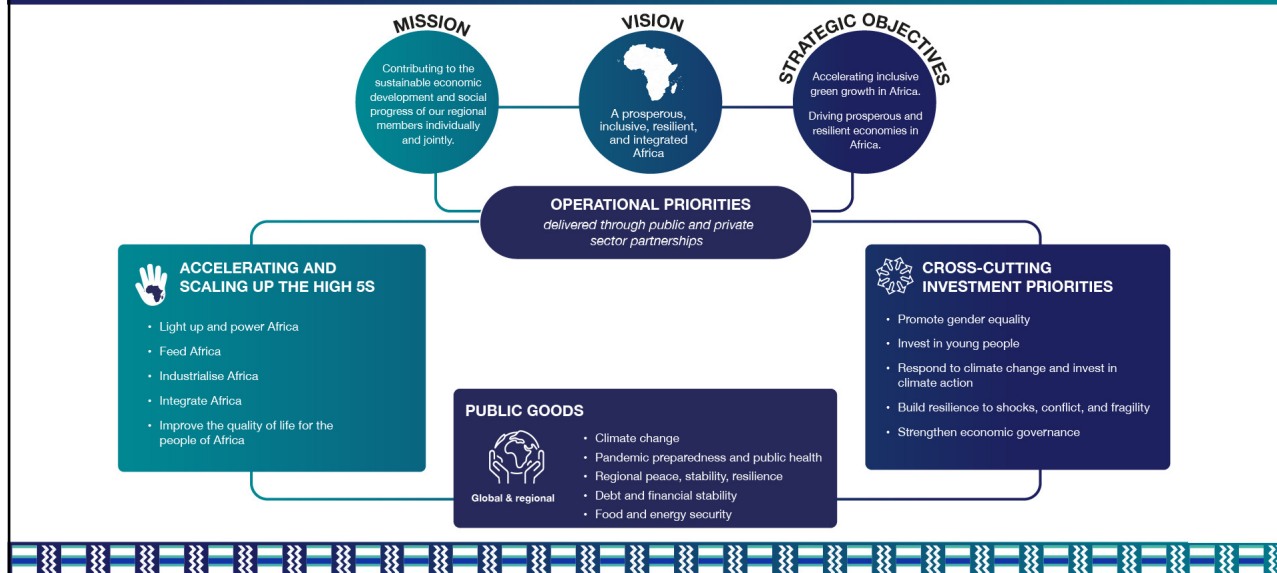

- The new Strategy is also fully aligned with the **G20 call for reforms** of the global financial architecture and the Multilateral Development Banks.
- The Bank will therefore adapt its **operational model** to improve efficiency and focus more on large transformative projects with greater impact.
- The Bank will scale up its **financial model**, to increase its financing capacity and mobilize more investment for the High 5s.
- The Bank will strengthen its **institutional model** by improving the quality and efficiency of operations, simplifying processes, and building a stronger learning culture.
- The Bank will also **strengthen knowledge solutions for Africa**.

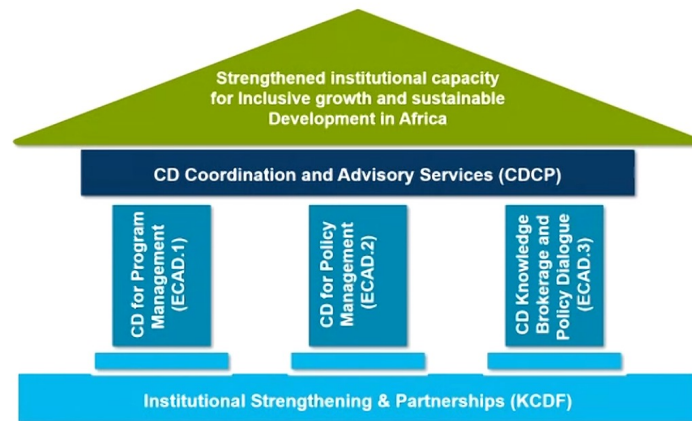
## BACKGROUND/CONTEXT

- 2015 SDGs - created great momentum to increase dev.. financing “from billions to trillions” to accelerate inclusive and green growth
- Yet “no matter the amount of financial resources mobilized for Africa’s development, such funds would yield only limited or modest results if countries do not have the human, organizational and institutional capacity to absorb and effectively utilize them.”
- African countries have made significant progress, but capacity remains a binding constraint to development.
- In 2015 the Bank articulated the High 5s to accelerate achievement of the SGDs in Africa.
- New TYS in 2024, recognizes the need for effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels.
- Especially, inst. capacities for: (i) program dev. & project management; (mgt); (ii) economic policy mgt - (DRM, public expenditure mgt, debt mgt, macro-economic and fiscal policy mgt, and public accountability systems), and (iii) capacity for effective knowledge mgt & policy dialogue.
- Remain binding constraints on inclusive development in many African countries.

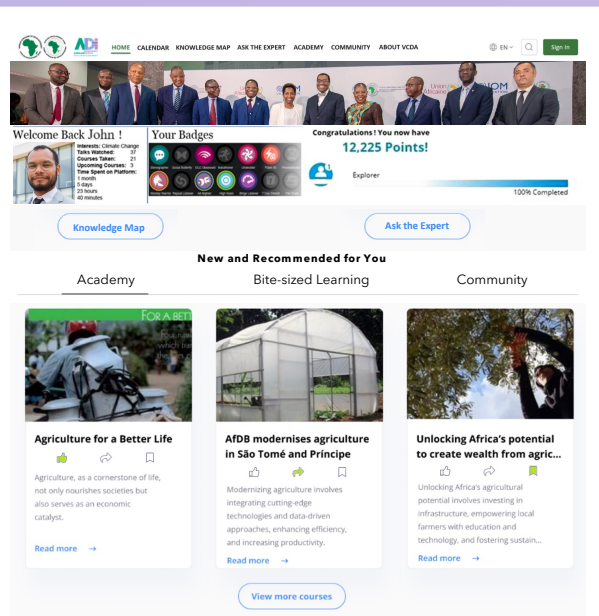
